SUBJECT:

EPS Street Check Update

RECOMMENDATION:

That the following recommendations be approved:

- 1. The 2018 external audit recommendation status update be marked as complete.
- 2. EPS reports to EPC on the Street Check File Reviews annually in November in line with the current audit process.

INTRODUCTION:

Street checks are a tool that the EPS uses to proactively gather street level intelligence and further investigations. In Edmonton, street checks are in essence wellness checks by a police officer on a member of the public. They are initiated by officers in response to crime trends, public safety concerns and may result from a Call for Service. When properly exercised, street level intelligence gathering is a critical tool for police in crime prevention and for furthering investigations.

BACKGROUND:

Across North America, the processes and practices used by police agencies to collect and store street level intelligence have been scrutinized by the public, media, and varying levels of government over the past few years. This scrutiny originated and centered in Toronto, where the term 'carding' was popularized. The EPS strives to maintain trust and transparency with the public, and so in 2016 initiated and completed a comprehensive Street Check Review on its policies, practices, and processes. The 2016 Street Check Review made 10 recommendations. Barring recommendations relying upon guidance from the Provincial Street Check Working Group, all recommendations have since been completed.

In 2018 the EPC engaged an external consultant to conduct a further review and audit designed to examine the use of Street Checks by the EPS amidst concerns of biased policing. This resulted in 17 recommendations focused on specific Street Check processes as well as broader suggestions such as increasing the diversity of EPS officers. EPS has done considerable work since then to address the recommendations – attachment 1. The outstanding recommendations from the

external audit are general observations on the state of EPS which are being addressed outside the street check process (such as diversity in hiring and the development of a community engagement strategy).

COMMENTS/DISCUSSION:

Street Checks are a critical tool for crime prevention and intelligence gathering and the Street Check Report (SCR) is an oversight mechanism to properly capture the *what, where, when, who and why.* Since the 2016 Street Check Review, extensive training has been delivered to recruits, frontline patrol members, patrol supervisors, and beat foot patrol members. Street checks and Street Check Reporting training is now a permanent syllabus component for all new sworn recruits and new patrol supervisors. Additionally, as part of an overall desire to make EPS more reflective of the communities it serves, EPS's recruiting practices have put an emphasis on increased diversity over the past few years.

Twice a year, an EPS committee of civilian and sworn members, uses a robust audit tool to assess compliance on average 190 randomly selected SCRs on information collection, fair and equitable policing and usage of correct reporting mechanisms. The May 2019 Street Check File Review noted that descriptors, which could be beneficial for police work were being omitted from SCRs. The same observation was noted in the October 2019 Street File Review. A project has been initiated to create an updated glossary for appropriate descriptors, which would provide consistent language for officers to use with confidence when filling out a SCR.

EPS reports to commission on the Street Check Reports currently through two different processes: through the semi-annual Street Check Report File Review and the Street Check Risk Audit Recommendation status update – attachment 2. The information EPC receives through the Street Check Risk Audit Recommendation status update can be provided through the November Audit process, instead of as a separate report. As the remaining work on street checks is part of larger organizational conversations, reporting to EPC on street checks should be streamlined with the internal risk audit process and the external audit recommendation status update be marked as complete.

CONCLUSION:

EPS has done considerable work over the past several years related to policy, practices, and training. EPS is continuing this work with projects like the descriptor ten codes; project on appropriate descriptor terminology and a review of its audit tool.

Oversight of outstanding recommendations on Street Checks will be tracked through the internal risk audit, planning and performance processes going forward.

EPS will continue to audit Street Check Reports twice a year to inform oversight and bring an annual report to EPC on the semi-annual Street Check Report File Review in November annually.
