7.1	Weekend Protest Update	
	Chief McFee advised that, with respect to the weekend protests, the Service needs to communicate more and will do so going forward. He advised that 70 tickets were issued overall, 20 for distracted driving (which is a larger fine under the Highway Traffic Act). He expressed understanding of the downtown concerns, adding that threats are different than noise and are taken seriously.	
	He introduced Superintendent Hilton who is a leading expert in handling these types of situations across Canada and teaches at the Canadian Police College.	
	Superintendent Hilton advised that all situations are different and have to be treated as such, as they are hard to predict. He further advised that steps are being taken to monitor the protests, plans are being reviewed and people are being heard. The Service wants to ensure the streets are safe and traffic moves. Comments and complaints are being taken seriously. Other strategies will be used this weekend.	
	Chief of Staff Krikler spoke about injunctions adding that notice needs to be given to those the injunction is being used for. Individuals can be arrested and removed but they cannot be held. It may be more advantageous to move individuals through rather than arrest them. Chief McFee added that the Service is talking with the City about other calming processes that can be used.	
	Chief McFee, Deputy Chief Brezinski, Superintendent Hilton and Chief of Staff Krikler responded to questions.	
7.3 Edmonton Police Service Budget Variance for the Period Ending December 31, 2021		
	Executive Director Davidson advised that with the \$7.4M 2021 budget over-spend the Service's operating reserve will be utilized, putting it in a deficit. On the capital side, this is the 3 <sup>rd</sup> of a 4-year cycle. The funds will be carried over to 2022. This	EPS
