Across the globe, various events are held during this special month as a way of recognising the influence LGBTQ people have had around the world.</li> <li>June was chosen to commemorate the Stonewall Riots that took place in June 1969. Over the years since the event,</li> </ul>	

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	many gay rights organizations have been formed around the world. As well as being a month-long celebration, Pride month is also an opportunity to peacefully protest and raise political awareness of current issues facing the community. It marks the start of huge change within the LGBTQ community, as well as the wider societal implications and by continuing in this long-standing tradition it continues to raise awareness, improve the attitudes of society, and encourage inclusiveness.	
	2.3 National Indigenous History Month Commissioner Calahoo-Stonehouse advised that June commemorates National Indigenous History Month with June 21 <sup>st</sup> being National Indigenous Peoples Day. 	He further advised that a timeline of the facts was established, adding that the Edmonton Police Service is conducting a homicide investigation and the RCMP is having an independent external review done of the matter.

	He explained what took place when Mr. Bone was brought to Edmonton, adding that the Service had minimal involvement with him before May 18, 2022. He advised that an incorrect public communications was previously released saying that Edmonton Police Services officers interacted with Mr. Bone when they did not. This is being corrected. He spoke to the events that took place and timelines involving the stakeholders.
