		"The Edmonton Police Commission acknowledges the traditional land on which we are gathered today, is on Treaty 6 Territory. I would like to thank the diverse Indigenous Peoples whose ancestors' footsteps have marked this territory for centuries such as: Nehiyaw (Cree), Dene, Anishnaabe (Saulteaux), Nakota Sioux and Niitsitapi (Blackfoot) peoples. We also acknowledge this as the Métis homeland and the home of one of the largest concentrations of Inuit south of the 60 th parallel. It is a welcoming place for all peoples who come from around the world to share Edmonton as a home. Together we call upon all of our collective, honoured traditions and spirits to work in building a great city for today and future generations."

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		On behalf of the Commission, Chair McDougall congratulated Constable Val Hoglund on receiving the Dempsey Service Award which is given to both civilian and sworn members who go above and beyond what is expected and make a lasting improvement towards individuals and the community they serve. It was stories of her helping troubled youth and her involvement with individuals with complex needs that garnished her nomination and ultimately receiving the award. He thanked Constable for her long-standing dedication to the improvement of our communities.

	 Key Issues Chief McFee highlighted the following: He spoke to the good work of Constables Voglund and Trenchard who recently received the awards recognized by the Commission 	

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	 AACPO Awards were provided to Edmonton Police Service Staff Sergeant Glen Klose and Sergeant Colleen Mooney for their work on member reintegration and critical stress incident personnel management The Guns and Gangs Strategy will address many things. It lays out a three-year plan to address firearm violence and gang-related crime in Edmonton. A tremendous amount of work has been put into it. It holds short and long-term solutions. Year-to-date (January 1-November 9, 2022) there have been 138 shootings 62% of shootings had the potential for innocent bystanders to be injured 52% of shootings resulted in injury 85% of shootings were targeted The new 10-Squad Model is now up and running. Once a pattern is established more detailed information will be shared on how it is going and the impacts seen. The Model is moving forward in response to community calls for more officers in patrol in their communities and at a time when there is a need to prioritize the wellness of officers. To properly deploy the 10-squad model, 71 additional constable positions were required for patrol with an additional five patrol sergeants. Early in the process, an opportunity to work static day shifts was posted and 31 members were identified to be moved into those positions from outside of patrol. To address the additional members needed, positions were identified from various areas throughout the organization The Service, along with the Commission, presented its Annual Report to Council. It was an opportunity to present on the Service's accountability frameworks and on the many ways in which the Service regularly reports to the Commission on its work. It was a good discussion and the Service was able to shed some additional light on the work it does
