I would like to thank the diverse Indigenous Peoples whose ancestors' footsteps have marked this territory for centuries such as: Nehiyaw (Cree), Dene, Anishnaabe (Saulteaux), Nakota Sioux and Niitsitapi (Blackfoot) peoples. We also acknowledge this as the Métis homeland and the home of one of the largest concentrations of Inuit south of the 60th parallel. It is a welcoming place for all peoples who come from around the world to share Edmonton as a home. Together we call upon all of our collective, honoured traditions and spirits to work in building a great city for today and future generations."

June 21st has also been declared National Indigenous Peoples Day, which is celebrated because of its significance	
	to the summer solstice, which is the longest day of the year.

	<ul> <li>Key Issues</li> <li>Chief McFee highlighted the following: <ul> <li>May 29, 2023 the Edmonton Police Service successfully launched its new Records Management System, Niche UA. He thanked Chief Innovation &amp; Technology Officer Anderson and his entire team for an oustanding success, and credited all officers who have been diligent in learning and adapting to the new system</li> <li>Last week the Public School Board released the results of the review of the School Resource Officer program, which reaffirmed the strength and benefits of the program. The program received positive response from current and former students and parents. The research published focused on the responses of racialized students and students from other marginalized groups</li> <li>Today the Healthy Street Operations Centre (HSOC) program was launched formally with the City of Edmonton. Minister Ellis and may other partner agencies took part. He highlighted one of the</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	

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	programs developed by the HSOC team, along with partners to protect vulnerable people in the community, which provides security for local residents on the day that their benefit cheques are available to them  • He provided shooting statistics for the month of May – 19 shootings – 15 targeted, 7 resulted in injuries – up 60 over 2022, and 76 shootings to date in 2023, a 19% increase over 2022 year to date, 521 firearms seizures so far this year  • Transit Safety – Q1 statistics show calls for service to transit rose by 14%. This was driven by ongoing escalation of violence on transit and calls of the Service to aid other agencies. Calls from other agencies increased 40%. Additional officers have been deployed into the system, the impact of which will be gauged in the coming months
