Comr	nissioner Kufuor-Boakye joined the meeting (12:21 p.m.)	
	6.1 <u>Control Tactics Statistics</u>	
	S/Sgt. Tassone provided an overview of the presentation and clarified definitions within the report.	
	S/Sgt. Tassone highlighted the following:	
	• The report indicates an increase in interactions with the public, yet the use of force options is decreasing, currently at less	
	<ul> <li>than one percent.</li> <li>Category One events (lower-level force options) are rising, while Category Two events (higher-level force options) are decreasing.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>CWs deployments are up, emphasizing verbal commands and de-escalation. Firearms deployment has decreased, indicating better control strategies.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Both subject and member injuries are decreasing, showcasing effective control techniques, and training strategies.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Interactions with individuals under the influence are increasing. However, injuries in these situations are trending downwards, indicating progress in handling such cases.</li> </ul>	
	Various strategies were discussed including training enhancement, exploring decentralized training approaches, conducting regular

debriefs for continuous improvement, and establishing consistent communication with the Professional Standards Branch.	
Chief McFee, S/Sgt.Tassone, and CITO Anderson answered questions from the Commissioners related to the report.	
<b>MOVED</b> Commissioner Stevenson – Chair Ambtman That the Edmonton Police Service amend the Control Tactic Report future reports to include data to supplement the ten most common occurrence types in which there was a control tactic used to include the total occurrence counts for those events citywide for the reporting period. <b>REFERRED</b>	EPS
<b>MOVED</b> Commissioner McDougall – Commissioner Amiri That the Edmonton Police Commission refers this motion to the Governance Committee for further discussions and recommendations to be brought back to the Commission of the whole. <b>CARRIED</b>	EPC
6.2 <u>Citizen Perception Survey</u>	
Director Harker and Program Manager Gazzola presented the report. Program Manager Gazzola delved into the survey results, emphasizing positive trends in Edmonton residents' perceptions of the EPS. Residents' approval of EPS's overall performance increased compared to 2022. Notably, disapproval ratings decreased, aligning closer to 2020 levels. She highlighted that the EPS partnered with Advanis for the survey, which implemented a random selection process. Regarding communication strategies, Program Manager Gazzola highlighted the focus on positive messaging to foster public engagement and targeted engagement with specific population segments aimed for deeper insights. As well as the continuation of initiatives such as youth engagement programs, recruitment efforts, and comprehensive employee training programs focusing on unconscious bias, cultural sensitivity and trauma informed approaches.	
Director Harker explained the shift in survey methodology, from using insights groups to adopting a fully representative approach reflecting the diverse communities within Edmonton.

8.	EDMONTON POLICE SERVICE REPORT(S)	
	8.1 <u>Key Issues</u>	
	<ul> <li>Chief McFee highlighted the following:</li> <li>Expressed gratitude for the attendance of commissioners at the Safety of Our Cities Conference, which attracted 600 participants.</li> <li>Management of the recent demonstrations in downtown Edmonton, where over 1,200 people were present. The EPS' objective was to maintain public safety, minimize disruptions, and document crowd behaviour for further review.</li> <li>Ongoing investigations are being conducted regarding potential charges related to the demonstration, with updates to be provided upon the conclusion of the investigations.</li> <li>Acknowledgement of the efforts of the EPS' audit branch in collaboration with City Council.</li> </ul>	
	There were no questions or comments from the commissioners.

8.2 <u>Safer Public Approach:</u>	
Deputy Chief Derko highlighted the initiative's purpose. He stressed the need to reorient the organization towards proactive community engagement. The approach involves addressing problems and disorders by positively engaging individuals on the street. The challenges faced on the streets, including mental health issues, addictions, and homelessness, were acknowledged. He emphasized the importance of communication with the public, outlining plans for increased outreach. Additionally, he mentioned the initiative to gather feedback from the patrol squad currently on the streets.	
Chief McFee provided additional insight, underlining the multi- dimensional nature of the initiative. He pointed at the need to address both violence and vulnerability within the community. He stressed the importance of using an appropriate system – be it health, social, or justice-based – tailored to the specific needs of the situation. The program aims for EPS members to engage with community members, aiming for a positive shift in street behaviour.	
Chief McFee recommended adding this item to the agenda for the Commission of the Whole at the next meeting. However, Chair Ambtman suggested that this item be included in the Governance Committee agenda as a quarterly item emphasizing the need to examine a periodic report on the initiative.	EPC
Chief McFee, Deputy Chief Derko and COO/Chief of Staff Okere responded to questions.

<ul> <li>Key points from the report include:</li> <li>The report does not include the impacts of the EPA settlements.</li> <li>Retroactive payments related to the settlement will be processed in August and September significantly impacting the financial reports.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>EPS is working with the City budget office on a budget transfer to offset the impacts of the retroactive payments.</li> <li>A budget transfer could potentially happen in September, but the more likely scenario is a transfer in November or December.</li> </ul>

	Chair Ambtman provided an update on the CAPG conference in St. John's. He expressed that this conference was distinct from previous CAPG conferences, as it primarily concentrated on governance and less on policing. He conveyed his approval of this shift, noting that the CAPG's dedication to providing more governance training to the public marked a significant step forward, and a positive direction for the Commission.

15.	EDMONTON POLICE COMMISSIONER COMMENTS/CONCERNS/ COMMENDATIONS	
	Commissioner Hamilton raised two questions:	
	<ol> <li>Commissioner Hamilton required revisitation of policies regarding cannabis use among police officers in light of the recent announcement by the RCMP. CAO Krikler confirmed that the EPS had implemented a new fit-for-duty policy on September 12<sup>th</sup>. This policy modernizes the approach to readiness to work under prescription or non-prescription drugs and alcohol and allows members to use cannabis provided they have a 24-hour gap between consumption and their next work shift.</li> <li>Commissioner Hamilton sought clarification on the process of declaring a riot and the legislative steps involved. Deputy Chief Driechel and Deputy Chief Derko provided detailed explanations. Authorization to read the Riot Act can be given to anyone designated within the scope of the authority, including Peace Officers and Police Officers.</li> </ol>	
	Commissioner McDougall shared his experience attending an Indigenous naming ceremony for Constable Catlin Chaisson. He highlighted the seamsless intergration of Indigenous perspective, Cst. Chaisson's personal experiences, and his professional life during the ceremony. He mentioned that Cst. Chaisson was given the name "Flying Eagle Spirit Child."
